

2021 Citizen Perspectives Survey Report Climate Change January 13, 2022

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Background

To help support City decisions, The City of Calgary surveys citizens about their opinions, preferences and attitudes. To help in "making life better every day" for Calgarians, The City conducts the Citizen Perspectives Survey at various intervals throughout the year. In 2018, The City ran a wave of the survey on the topic of extreme weather and home energy efficiency. In 2019, the survey was conducted again but with the addition of questions about climate change. The survey, including the new climate change questions and minor revisions, was conducted in 2020 and 2021. This report presents the results of the 2021 survey as well as results from the previous surveys for tracking purposes, where applicable.

Methodology

The telephone survey was conducted by Leger November 22 -December 1, 2021 with 500 Calgarians. To ensure a random and statistically representative sample of Calgarians was obtained, Leger used random digit dialing (RDD) of both landlines (23% of completed surveys) and cell phones (77% of completes). Sample quotas were set for age, gender, and city quadrant of the general population aged 18 years and older. Data were then weighted to the 2016 Civic Census for age and gender. The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of n=500 is \pm 4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The survey averaged 23 minutes in duration.

- Although the majority of Calgarians are satisfied overall with the job The City is doing to protect the environment, fewer are 'very satisfied' than 'somewhat satisfied.'
- When it comes specifically to climate change, a slight majority think The City should be doing more than it currently is and around one-half of Calgarians trust The City as a source of information about climate change.
- Awareness of elements of The City's Climate Program is not very high.
- The majority of Calgarians agree:
 - They're concerned about climate change (causes and impacts);
 - · Climate change is caused mostly by human activities;
 - Their individual actions contribute to the issue;
 - We need to act now to address the causes and prepare for local impacts;
 - · Calgarians should be doing more to prevent climate change; and
 - They are personally taking action and want to do more to help prevent it.
- Calgarians 18 to 34 years of age, those who identify as being of Asian descent, and those born outside of Canada are more likely to agree than other Calgarians to agree with the above sentiments about climate change.
- A large minority say they've become more supportive of taking action on climate change in the past year, with the main reason being an increase in extreme weather events.
- The majority of Calgarians support the city (The City and citizens) moving to a target of net-zero emissions by the year 2050.
- A majority of Calgarians are concerned about the impact extreme weather events are having, or might have, on their life, and the proportion saying they are 'very concerned' increased since last year.
- Calgarians are more likely to say they've taken energy-saving actions to save money rather than because of environmental concerns.







Perceptions of Calgary's Environment and The City's Protection Efforts



Summary: Calgary's Environment

Nearly all Calgarians rate the overall state of the city's environment as good and the majority are satisfied with The City's protection of the environment and related programs and services.

- Most Calgarians (96%) rate the overall state of Calgary's environment as good ('very good' or 'good'), consistent with results since 2018.
- Four-in-five (82%) are satisfied with the job The City is doing to protect the environment, on par with results since 2018.
- Four-in-five (79%) are satisfied with The City's programs and services aimed at helping Calgarians reduce their environmental impact.

Climate Change



The majority of Calgarians are concerned about the causes and impacts of climate change and agree we need to act now to address the causes and prepare for local impacts.

- Nearly four-in-five Calgarians (78%) agree they are concerned about the causes of climate change and three-quarters (74%) agree they're concerned about the impacts of climate change on Calgarians.
- The majority (78%) agree we need to act now to prepare for local impacts of climate change and as many (77%) agree we need to act now to address the causes.

The majority of Calgarians agree climate change is caused mostly by human activities and that their individual actions contribute to global climate change.

• Seven-in-ten Calgarians (71%) agree that climate change is caused mostly by human activities and as many (73%) agree their individual actions contribute to global climate change, both measures on par with results from 2020.

The majority agree Calgarians should be doing more to help prevent climate change, they are taking action to help prevent it, and they want to do more personally to help prevent it; however, fewer agree they are taking action to prepare for a changing climate.

- Seven-in-ten Calgarians (72%) agree Calgarians should be doing more to prevent climate change.
- Four-in-five (79%) agree they are taking action to help prevent climate change and three-quarters (75%) agree they want to do more personally to help prevent it.
- Three-in-five Calgarians (60%) agree they are taking action to prepare for a changing climate.

Summary: Climate Change – cont'd

A slight majority of Calgarians think The City should be doing more to address climate change than it currently is doing.

• Just more than one-half (58%) of Calgarians think The City should be doing more to address climate change, consistent with results from 2020; however, the proportion who think The City is doing the right amount dropped from 37% in 2020 to 27% in 2021 and there was an increase in the proportion saying The City should be doing less, from 8% in 2020 to 15% in 2021.

The majority of Calgarians say they were supportive of taking action on climate change one year ago and just under one-half of Calgarians say they've become more supportive in the past year.

- Four-in-five Calgarians (79%) say that one year ago, they were supportive of taking action on climate change and two-in-five Calgarians (43%) say that they have become more supportive of taking action on climate change in the past year.
- Among those who say they are more supportive now, just over one-half (55%) were already 'very' supportive one year ago and two-in-five (39%) were 'somewhat' supportive. Among Calgarians who are less supportive now, 7% were 'very' supportive last year and 28% were 'somewhat' supportive.
- The main reason given for becoming more supportive of taking action on climate change is the increase in extreme weather events (51%, up from 24% in 2020). Other reasons include it's getting worse/we're at a tipping point (13%, up from 4% in 2020), we need to clean up/be greener/reduce our carbon footprint (12%, up from 6% in 2020 and on par with 2019) and seeing the effects of climate change (11%).
- Among those who were very supportive of taking action one year ago, 64% are even more supportive now, 32% haven't changed their support in the past year, and only 3% are less supportive. Among those who were somewhat supportive one year ago, 41% are now more supportive and 47% are neither more nor less supportive while 12% are now less supportive.
- Among those who were very opposed to taking action on climate change one year ago¹, only 3% are more supportive now, 29% haven't changed their support, and 68% are even less supportive now. Among those who were somewhat opposed to taking action one year ago¹, 9% are more supportive, 30% are neither more nor less supportive, and 61% are less supportive now.

Calgary



Around one-half of Calgarians trust The City as a source of information about climate change.

• Approximately one-half (53%) of Calgarians trust The City as a source of climate change information while around one-in-five (18%) neither trust nor distrust The City and one-quarter (26%) distrust The City as a source of information about this topic.

Awareness of various elements of The City's Climate Program is not very strong.

• One-half (48%) of Calgarians are aware that the Climate Program includes a climate action plan. Fewer are aware that the program includes a Clean Energy Improvement Program (35%), a Climate Ready Home Guide (28%), or the Calgary Climate Symposium (19%).

The majority of Calgarians support Calgary moving to net-zero emissions by the year 2050.

• After hearing a brief definition of net-zero emissions: "reducing the amount of man-made greenhouse gas released into the atmosphere and removing an equivalent amount of emissions from the environment", three-quarters (77%) say they support the city, meaning the municipal government and citizens, moving to net-zero by the year 2050.



Summary: Climate Change - cont'd

Those aged 18 to 34 years are more likely than older Calgarians to agree they're concerned about the causes and impacts of climate change and supportive of doing more to prevent it.

- Calgarians 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than those 35 to 64 and 65 or older to agree with the following statements:
 - Climate change is caused mostly by human activities (81% vs. 67% and 64%, respectively);
 - My individual actions contribute to global climate change (83% vs. 70% and 63%);
 - I am concerned about the causes of climate change (86% vs. 74% and 73%);
 - I am concerned about the impacts of climate change on Calgarians (81% vs. 71% and 68%);
 - I think we need to act now to address the causes of climate change (89% vs. 71% and 74%);
 - I think Calgarians should be doing more to help prevent climate change (81% vs. 68% and 67%);
 - I think we need to act now to prepare for local impacts of climate change (86% vs. 75% and 71%); and
 - I want to do more personally to help prevent climate change (86% vs. 72% and 64%).
- Calgarians 18 to 64 are more likely than seniors to agree they're taking action to prevent climate change (84% 18 to 34 and 81% 35 to 64 vs. 66% 65 or older).
- Calgarians 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than those 35 to 64 to support the city (municipal government and citizens) moving to a target of net-zero emissions by the year 2050 (83% vs. 73%, respectively).



Summary: Climate Change - cont'd

Females are more likely than males to agree their individual actions contribute to global climate change, they want to do more personally to help prevent climate change, and Calgarians should be doing more to help prevent it.

- Females are more likely than males to agree with the following statements:
 - My individual actions contribute to global climate change (78% vs. 69%, respectively);
 - I want to do more personally to help prevent climate change (79% vs. 71%); and
 - I think Calgarians should be doing more to help prevent climate change (79% vs. 66%).
- Males are more likely than females to *dis*agree with the following statements:
 - My individual actions contribute to global climate change (26% vs. 16%, respectively);
 - I think we need to act now to prepare for local impacts of climate change (21% vs. 14%);
 - I think Calgarians should be doing more to help prevent climate change (24% vs. 14%); and
 - I think we need to act now to address the causes of climate change (20% vs. 12%).

Females are more likely than males to say that one year ago, they were supportive of taking action on climate change but there is no gender difference in terms of change in support compared to one year ago.

• Females are more likely than males to say that one year ago, they were supportive of taking action on climate change (82% vs. 75%); however, they are as likely as males to now be more supportive (44% vs. 43%, respectively), neither more nor less supportive (38% vs. 37%), or less supportive (16% vs. 19%) in the past year.

Summary: Climate Change – cont'd

Those who identify as being of Asian descent¹ are more likely than Calgarians who identify as Canadian/French Canadian, White/Caucasian, or European² to be concerned about climate change and support taking action regarding it.

- Calgarians who identify as being of Asian descent are more likely than those who identify as Canadian/French Canadian, White/Caucasian, or European to agree with the following statements about climate change:
 - I am concerned about the causes of climate change (91% vs. 70%, 73%, and 75%, respectively);
 - I am concerned about the impacts of climate change on Calgarians (86% vs. 71%, 70%, and 73%);
 - Climate change is caused mostly by human activities (87% vs. 60%, 69%, and 70%);
 - My individual actions contribute to global climate change (86% vs. 69%, 70%, and 70%);
 - I think Calgarians should be doing more to help prevent climate change (85% vs. 67%, 71%, and 71%);
 - I want to do more personally to help prevent climate change (92% vs. 65%, 73%, and 71%);
 - I think we need to act now to address the causes of climate change (90% vs. 66%, 75%, and 76%);
 - I think we need to act now to prepare for local impacts of climate change (92% vs. 69%, 76%, and 74%);
 - I am taking action to prepare for a changing climate (73% vs. 52%, 55%, and 60%).
- Although there is no statistically significant difference in overall agreement with the statement "I am taking action to help prevent climate change," those of Asian descent are more likely than others to 'strongly' agree (39% vs. 17% Canadian/French Canadian, 25% Caucasian/White, and 26% European descent).
- Calgarians of Asian descent are more likely than those who identify as Canadian/French Canadian, White/Caucasian, or European to:
 - Have been supportive of taking action on climate change one year ago (89% vs. 76%, 75%, and 78%, respectively);
 - Be more supportive of taking action compared to one year ago (58% vs. 33%, 38%, and 42%);
 - Trust The City as a source of information about climate change (66% vs. 50%, 47%, and 50%); and
 - Support the city (municipal government and citizens) moving to a target of net-zero emissions by the year 2050 (89% vs. 64%, 76%, and 77%).

¹"Asian" descent includes those who identify as South Asian, East Asian, Southeast Asian, West Asian, or Middle Eastern.

²Sample sizes for other ethnicities are too small to report results.

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Summary: Climate Change - cont'd

Foreign-born Calgarians are more likely than those born in Canada to be concerned about climate change and support taking action regarding it.

- Calgarians who were born outside of Canada are more likely than those born in Canada to agree with the following statements:
 - I am concerned about the causes of climate change (84% vs. 75%, respectively);
 - Climate change is caused mostly by human activities (79% vs. 67%);
 - My individual actions contribute to global climate change (79% vs. 70%);
 - I want to do more personally to help prevent climate change (85% vs. 71%);
 - I think we need to act now to address the causes of climate change (86% vs. 73%);
 - I think we need to act now to prepare for local impacts of climate change (85% vs. 74%);
 - I am taking action to prepare for a changing climate (70% vs. 55%).
- Foreign-born Calgarians are also more likely than other Calgarians to say they've become more supportive of taking action on climate change in the past year (51% vs. 40%, respectively) and to trust The City as a source of information about climate change (63% vs. 48%).

Extreme Weather Events



The majority of Calgarians have been impacted by at least one type of extreme weather event in the past five years.

- Nearly three-quarters (72%) of Calgarians have been impacted by at least one type of extreme weather event in the past five years, up from 63% in 2020 and on par with 2019. Being 'impacted' means experiencing damage, incurring costs, health impacts or injury as a result of the weather event.
- Nearly one-half (45%) of Calgarians say they have been impacted by wildfire/smoke, up from 37% in 2020 but consistent with 2018 and 2019. Four-in-five (38%) were impacted by hailstorms, up from 28% in 2020 but on par with 2018 and 2019. Around one-quarter (29%) were impacted by snow/ice storms and one-quarter (24%) by heat waves/extreme heat, up from 10% in 2020. One-in-five (20%) were impacted by severe winds, consistent with results dating back to 2018.
- Fewer say they were impacted by extreme rain events and associated flooding, excluding river flooding (10%), drought (6%), river flooding (5%), or tornados (1%).

The types of extreme weather events Calgarians most anticipate will increase in frequency in the next ten years are wildfires/smoke, heat waves/extreme heat, and hailstorms.

- Nearly two-thirds (64%) of Calgarians think there will be more wildfires/smoke in the next decade, nearly as many (62%) think there will be more heat waves/extreme heat (up from 49% in 2020), and around one-half (53%) think there will be more hailstorms.
- Around one-half (48%) of Calgarians think there will be more drought in the next ten years (up from 38% in 2020) and just as many (47%) expect more extreme rain events and associated flooding.



Summary: Extreme Weather - cont'd

The majority of Calgarians have taken at least one action to reduce the impact of extreme weather events on them.

- Approximately four-in-five Calgarians (82%) have taken at least one action to reduce the impact of extreme weather events on them.
- One-third of Calgarians have purchased an air purifier (33%, up from 27% in 2020), improved water drainage on their property (32%), installed air conditioning (32%, up from 26% in 2020) and/or planted trees for shade (31%). One-quarter have planted drought-resistant plants (25%) while one-in-five purchased flood insurance (21%) and/or installed hail-resistant roofing (20%). Fewer have moved to a different location (13%) or installed hail-resistant siding (12%).

The majority of Calgarians are concerned about the impact of extreme weather events on their life and their level of concern has increased since 2020.

• Two-thirds (66%) of Calgarians are concerned about the impact extreme weather events are having, or might have, on their life. While statistically consistent with 2020 (62%), the proportion saying they are 'very' concerned has increased from 14% to 26% in the past year while fewer say they are 'somewhat' concerned (40%, down from 48% last year).

Calgarians are divided in terms of who they think should be leading citizens in taking action to reduce impacts of extreme weather events.

When asked, unaided, who they think should be leading citizens in taking action to help reduce the potential impacts of extreme weather events, first mentions are split between municipal government (24%), provincial government (17%), federal government (16%), and individuals/citizens (14%). Nearly one-in-ten (7%) say everyone needs to do their part and one-in-ten (10%) answered "don't know."



Summary: Extreme Weather - cont'd

Calgarians 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than those 35 or older to anticipate there being more extreme heat/heat wave events and wildfire/smoke in the next ten years and more likely than those 65 or older to be concerned about the impact of extreme weather events on them.

- Those 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than older Calgarians to expect we'll see more extreme heat/heat wave events (72% vs. 58% 35 to 64 and 55% 65 or older) and/or more wildfire/smoke (74% vs. 60% 35 to 64 and 58% 65 or older) in the next ten years.
- Compared to seniors, Calgarians aged 18 to 34 are more likely to be concerned about the impact extreme weather events are having, or might have, on their lives (72% 18 to 34 vs. 58% 65 or older).

Females are more likely than males to expect there to be more extreme weather events in the next ten years and to be concerned about the impact of them on their life.

- Females are more likely than males to anticipate more of the following extreme weather events in the next 10 years:
 - Snow/ice storms (41% vs. 32%, respectively).
 - Hailstorms (60% vs. 46%);
 - River flooding (47% vs. 35%);
 - Drought (55% vs. 41%);
 - Extreme heat/heat waves (68% vs. 56%); and
 - Wildfire/smoke (71% vs. 57%).
- Females are more likely than males to be concerned about the impact extreme weather events are having, or might have, on their lives (73% vs. 60%, respectively).

Summary: Home Energy Efficiency

Energy efficient appliances and programmable thermostats are the most common home energy efficient actions undertaken by Calgarians overall.

- Home energy improvements reported by the most Calgarians are energy efficient appliances (69%), a programmable thermostat (69%), and weather-stripping or caulking around doors/windows (55%). More than two-in-five (44%) have energy efficient windows.
- Among those living in a single-detached home, a duplex/triplex/fourplex, or a townhouse/rowhouse, the majority (69%) have insulated basements and/or an energy efficient furnace (60%). Substantially fewer have insulated exposed hot water pipes (37%) and/or increased insulation in their attic (30%). Only 2% have solar panels.

The vast majority of Calgarians report they regularly turn off lights when not needed and/or using energy efficient bulbs but fewer wash laundry in cold water or unplug electronics when not being used.

- Nearly all Calgarians (96%) say they regularly turn off lights when not needed in order to save energy in their home and nine-inten (90%) use energy efficient bulbs.
- Fewer, although still the majority of Calgarians, minimize the use of air conditioning in the summer (76%), keep heat set to a lower temperature in the winter (72%), wash laundry in cold water (69%). Just over one-half (56%) unplug electronics when they're not in use.



Summary: Home Energy Efficiency – cont'd

Saving money continues to outweigh environmental concerns as the reason for taking actions to save energy.

• The most common reason given for taking actions to save energy is to save money, with 58% of Calgarians saying this is the main reason and 74% saying it is one of the reasons. Fewer say protecting the environment, global warming or reducing greenhouse emissions is the main reason (19%) or one of the reasons (47%) they are taking actions to save energy. The term "climate change" was mentioned by 5% as the main reason and by 11% as one of the reasons.

Consistent with previous years, cost is the most common reason among Calgarians for not doing more to save energy.

- Around two-in-five Calgarians (43%) say cost/not having the money needed is the main reason they don't do more to save energy and 51% say it is one of the reasons.
- One-in-ten (11%) say they already do as much as they can to save energy.

When asked who should be leading citizens in taking action to improve home energy efficiency, the top-of-mind response is the municipal government, followed by individuals/citizens, provincial government and the federal government.

• The top-of-mind response regarding who should be leading citizens in taking action to improve home energy efficiency is municipal government, mentioned by 23% of Calgarians. Other top-of-mind responses are individuals/citizens (17%), provincial government (15%), and federal government (15%).
